# Good turnout for ANZAC Day

ANZAC Day services were extremely well attended again in Rylstone and Kandos, with numbers seeming to exceed expectations each year. In Rylstone, around 180 people attended the Dawn Service held at the Memorial outside the Memorial Hall at 6am. The sombre occasion was highlighted again this year by local school students reciting essays they had written for the occasion. This was a moving moment as always and much appreciated by the crowd. Later, at the 11am Commemorative Service, around 70 people gathered to pay their respects to the fallen and to remember family members who served in conflicts near and far across many decades of our history.

In Kandos, it is estimated that around 160 people attended the 6.30am Dawn Service held at the War Memorial next to the Community Hall. It was a very moving service as always with wreaths laid and essays recited by local school students. For those who couldn't get to the service this year, local radio station KRR once again broadcast the service live to air. At around 10.30am, large groups of people from across the community gathered at the Rotunda in Angus Avenue for the march to the Community Hall for the 11am Commemorative Service. This year the march was led by RAAF serviceman Jayden Taylor, local resident Lyn Rawlinson and school cadet Campbell. They were followed by ex-service men and women, Kandos RSL Sub Branch members and auxiliary members. A large group of individuals wearing badges of deceased members of their families were also represented, along with Kandos Primary and High Schools, Rylstone Public School, Ilford Public School and the First Kandos Scouts. The marchers received loud applause from the crowd that lined Angus Avenue. Following the march onlookers joined the various groups for the 11am Commemorative Service in the packed hall for a very moving service

### Rural Fire Service thanks our community

As a challenging Bush Fire Danger Period ends in our region, Rural Fire Service Cudgegong District Superintendent Troy Porter thanked the many members of our community – from employers and media outlets to merchants and the families of RFS volunteers, for the help and support they provided during repeated times of need.

"This has been the most difficult fire season we have experienced in a number of years," Superintendent Porter said. "It included the districts first day with a Fire Danger Rating of Catastrophic, the highest danger rating possible. Our volunteers battled the White Cedars Road, Kains Flat fire that blackened almost 7,000 hectares of our district during the last half of February as well as numerous other local fires, both large and small, and two major fires just outside our northern and western borders. A number of these fires required days of around-the-clock firefighting. They involved virtually every RFS brigade in the district and task forces supplied by other districts across New South Wales. Thanks to their efforts along with the cooperation of so many community members there was no loss of life due to fires

and we lost only one shed to the flames.

"Employers across the Cudgegong District, which covers the Mid-Western Regional Council Area, helped us accomplish this by generously allowing our volunteers to trade work clothes for yellow RFS uniforms time and again when we needed them. I offer my sincere thanks to all of those employers who did so. My thanks also go out to news media outlets in the district who presented fire safety material throughout the Danger Period, helping prevent untold numbers of fires from starting, and who provided vital information on how to survive fires when they occur along with timely updates during our major fires. There were numerous businesses that donated food for fire fighters or opened their doors to people who had evacuated their homes and needed a place away from the danger zone to wait for the fire to pass. Last, but by no means least, I want to thank all of our volunteers for their selfless response when fire calls went out and to their families for the understanding and support they provided to those who were battling the flames,' Superintendent Porter said.

#### Sewer maintenance

As part of Mid-Western Regional Council's investment in the rehabilitation of the region's sewer network, scheduled maintenance will be carried out from now until August. Maintenance works will include Closed Circuit Television (CCTV) inspections of main sewer pipes, cleaning of sewer pipes, relining of sewer pipes and some excavation work. Residents may experience an increase in noise and vehicle movements.

Before maintenance works begin, residents will be notified via letter drop and door knocking from works teams as they make their way from street to street. There may be a small risk of pressure build up that may cause back pressure in your toilet. Work will be carried out Mondays to Fridays from 7am to 5pm and 7am to 1pm on Saturdays.

# KHS ANZAC Day Assembly

Staff and students of Kandos High School commemorated the fallen during their ANZAC Day service on April 26. They welcomed Ken Bevitt, Glen Evans, Ray Stout and John Taylor who represented the Kandos RSL Sub Branch. Mr Taylor, who is President of the Sub Branch addressed the assembly. A former graduate from KHS in 1963, he was conscripted for National Service along with eight other KHS graduates and served in Nui Dat, Vietnam with the Royal Australian Engineers corps of the Australian Army 1970-1971. Also in attendance was former KHS Vice-Captain, Jayden Taylor now serving with the RAAF as an Aircraftman. Awards were presented to two students who entered the RSL Sub Branch Essay Competition. Congratulations to Ally Jupp who was the winner and Jasmine Kernaghan who was runner-up. At the end of the assembly everyone was treated to an Anzac biscuit made by teacher Julie Parsons and the 9/10 Food Tech class.

### Library upgrade

Kandos Library has been undergoing a major refurbishment and has been temporarily closed. The work follows a \$40,000 NSW Government grant and will deliver an accessible service desk along with cosmetic updates for the comfort of library users. The Kandos Library was established in 1969 and has nearly 14,000 library card holders in the region. There are a total of 7,060 items for loan at the library including 1,370 items for children and young adults to borrow.

# Wind farm approved

The Crudine Ridge Wind Farm has received Federal Government approval. The project will include the construction and operation of a wind farm of up to 37 wind turbines and infrastructure. Mid-Western Regional Council is continuing discussions with the proponent on upgrades for Sally's Flat Road and transport routes during construction.

## **Museum portraits**

Kandos Museum was the venue for a number of interesting art features during Cementa 17 including Paul Greedy's piano wire arrangement in the ball mill in the museum grounds, John Conomos's video performance "Paging Mr Hitchcock", Nicole Welch's provocative "Wildēornes Body" and Mervyn Bishop's

"Portrait of Elders". This last display featured a series of photographic portraits which presented eight portraits of Kandos Elders who are either descendants of the local Dabee tribe, immigrants who moved to Kandos after World War II or local characters who everyone in town would recognise. Community Capers editor was lucky enough to be viewing these portraits when one of the featured elders, Stanisiawa Stefania Rozenblatt (Stasia Rozenblatt) walked into the museum to view the completed work. It was a great opportunity to take a photo of her standing in the museum next to her portrait.

# Sam heads to Belgium

The son of a local Carwell farmer and University of Sydney student, Sam Coggins has been selected to represent Australia at Bayer's upcoming 2017 Youth Ag-Summit to be held in Belgium in October. Sam has been selected alongside two fellow Aussies, forming part of the 100-strong delegate team made up of young thought leaders hailing from 49 countries around the world. This year's Summit is themed Feeding a hungry Planet and aims to address the UN Sustainability Goals of ending hunger, achieving food security and promoting sustainable agriculture.

Sam submitted an essay that focused on the seemingly universal stigmas surrounding genetic modification and careers in agriculture as two critical stumbling blocks hindering food security. The final delegates were selected from almost 1,200 applicants aged between 18 and 25 and they share a passion for agriculture and a vision of a world without hunger. During the summit, they will share their diverse experiences and work together to generate innovative, sustainable and actionable solutions to global food security challenges. Across five days, delegates will undertake group projects and participate in industry tours, as well as learning from expert guest speakers. Their mission is to come up with concrete new ideas which can drive agricultural progress across the globe and be put into practice back home.

Liam Condon, member of the Board of Management of Bayer AG and head of the Crop Science Division said The Youth Ag-Summit aims to give young leaders the opportunity to foster their ideas, share best practices and explore the role of modern agriculture in feeding a hungry planet. In explaining the selection process, managing director of Bayer Australia Tobias Marchand said that to be considered for participation, prospective delegates were required to submit an essay of 1,500 words on the topic of food insecurity.

"A total of 1,187 essays from 95 different countries were submitted - all of which were reviewed by a panel of industry experts. The Australian applicants put a lot of effort into their essays and we were really impressed with the overall calibre of this year's entries. Sam shared a creative and passionate view on sustainable food security and agriculture and his contribution will form part of the basis for discussion at the Youth Ag-Summit. We look forward to Sam representing Australia later this year," he said.

# **Letters to the Editor**

Save the Cemetery

Dear Sir,

I am concerned that the Carwell Cemetery on the Cudgegong Road towards Windamere Dam is under threat. This cemetery is important not only to me but to the whole district. The most recent burials there were in 1995 of Dr Bill Nevell and his mother. For those generations descended from the Carwell Nevells there has always been the option of being buried there. Suddenly, we were informed in 2016 that the cemetery was to be sold because of unpaid rates. This has caused quite a lot of angst and worry. As no single entity was the owner, I have asked the question, "To whom have the rates notices been sent?" I cannot get an answer to that.

In this cemetery is the crypt of James Vincent, who having settled in Bathurst with his son-in-law and daughter in 1818 set off to explore the area of Clandulla and Rylstone. He settled at "Flatlands" now called "Rootreat" and in 1824 explored down the Carwell Creek. He tried to purchase the lands of Carwell but was upstaged by Edward Cox, who in 1829 sold Carwell to James Vincent. The local landmark Mt Vincent is named after him. There are two other graves of historical interest in the Carwell Cemetery – John Nevell, who was among the first 10 to receive land grants at Bathurst (Kelso) in 1818 and Edward Readford. None of us were aware that after 172 years of use, suddenly the cemetery was being rated. The area is half an acre but is being rated at the minimum rate. Is there nothing that can be done to protect this from what may be a bulldozer levelling the lot?




